Thank You to our AP proctors and students for a great effort on the Advanced Placement Exams

Congratulation to MMHS Jr. Cam Kergo for winning the MIAA Division IV Championship in the high jump. Cam jumped a school record 6'8" which was the highest jump of all the divisional finals. He also places third in the Long Jump with a leap of 21'5 ¼ inches.

Local Education Agency (LEA) Assignments (cont.)

According to the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, a LEA, or school district, shall have programmatic and fiscal responsibility for students who reside with both parents in the town in which the school district is located. There are various situations that could alter this regulation. For example, when parents are divorced, and a child requires an out-of-district placement, the two towns where the parents reside may be equally responsible, both fiscally and programmatically. Another instance that affects fiscal and programmatic responsibility is when a student is placed in the custody of the Department of Children and Family (DCF). When a student is placed in DCF custody (i.e., group home- which may be located in a different town) and that student requires a day or residential placement, the district(s) where the parents(s) live is fiscally responsible for that placement.

JOB DESCRIPTION: SCHOOL PHYSICIAN CONSULTANT

SCHOOL PHYSICIAN REPORTS TO: Superintendent

SCOPE OF RESPONSIBILITIES

The school physician consultant functions as part of the health team addressing the health issues of the students and staff in the Mashpee Public School District. The school health program emphasizes health promotion and is an important part of the health care delivery system serving children in the community. The school physician contracts with and works in collaboration with the school administration and the school nurses to develop and implement the school health program. The school physician provides medical expertise and consultation to the school health program in areas of administration and planning, direct service, clinical consultation, policy consultation, health education, public relations and advocacy for the school health program and serves as a liaison to community physicians and health care resources.

QUALIFICATIONS

The school physician must have a valid license to practice medicine in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts (M.G.L. c. 71, s. 53)

The school physician must be knowledgeable about the health needs of children and adolescents.

ACTIVITIES/RESPONSIBILITIES

- I. Administration and Planning**
 - a. Supports the school nursing staff in planning and implementing the school health service program
 - b. Assists in administering the program cooperatively with the school nursing staff, the school administration, and the local school committee
 - c. Meets with the school nurses to review, evaluate and revise the program at least once per year, and as needed
 - d. Assists in emergency care planning for the school district, as requested
 - e. Participates in professional development relevant to school health, as needed
 - f. Consults regarding health grant applications, as needed

- II. Direct Service**
 - a. May provide as needed with parental permission, a physical examination and necessary immunizations for a new student who has yet to be linked to a primary care provider, enabling the student to both enter and fully participate in school activities. The school physician should follow the guidelines of the American Academy of Pediatrics for conducting a comprehensive physical examination.
 - b. May provide, as needed with parental permission, a physical examination at designated intervals (entry, every 3-4 years thereafter, annually prior to participation in competitive sports, and for children between 14 and 16 years of age requesting work permits- M.G.L. c. 149, s.87) when a student lacks a primary care provider.

III. Clinical Consultation

- a. Consults on clinical issues with the school nurses, as needed
- b. Consults on clinical or school health program issues with the school administrators, and school committee, as needed

Issues that may require school physician consultation may include, but are not limited to:

- Students with special health care needs
- Immunizations or implementation of state mandated immunization regulations
- Infection and outbreak control (in collaboration with the Board of Health or Department of Public Health)
- Vision, hearing and postural screening
- Mental health issues
- Classroom management of the child with physical or emotional issues (as requested by the school nurse, teacher or parent)
- Medical transportation issues for children with special health care needs
- School environmental issues, as they arise (e.g. air quality, building safety, playground safety)
- Medical orders for emergency medications (e.g. epinephrine)
- Annual standing orders for treatments and approved "as needed" medications
- Nutritional issues as they relate to such areas as the food service program, eating disorders, etc.
- Health room facilities and equipment

IV. Policy & Protocol Consultation

- a. Participates as an active member or in a consultative role to the Health Advisory Committee
- b. Collaborates with the school nurse to provide consultation on policies pertaining to the health and safety of the school students and staff, as needed. (e.g. first aid program, anaphylaxis protocol, athletic safety)

Policies & Protocols may include but are not limited to:

- Crisis intervention
- Emergency and disaster planning and preparedness (collaborating with local emergency medical services)
- Immunization
- Substance use/abuse, including tobacco
- Medical transportation
- Health school environment (both physical and social)
- Nutrition issues including food services
- Infection control and standard precautions
- Attendance guidelines, including exclusion for illness
- Medication administration, including non-prescription medications
- AED
- Life Threatening Allergy
- Wellness

V. Health Education

- a. May provide consultation, as needed and as requested, on health education curricula in grades pre-kindergarten through grade 12
- b. May present classroom lectures on relevant topics for faculty, parents and students, as requested
- c. May provide medical information and health education for school nurses, staff, students and their families, as appropriate
- d. May participate in school-sponsored health fairs

VI. Public Relations

- a. May represent the school on health issues in the media (as requested by school administration) when a crisis occurs in the school or regarding the school aged population
- b. When possible, attends annual school physician conference

VII. Advocacy

- a. Advocates for additional school health resources, as needed
- b. Advocates for appropriate health care for children and adolescents as needed
- c. Serves as a liaison with community health resources and primary care physicians, as needed

SCHOOL COMMITTEE SELF-EVALUATION

The Education Reform Act of 1993 strengthened the requirement for accountability in the delivery of education to our students. To that end, the law now calls for the superintendent of schools to "cause the evaluation" of every employee in the school system.

But who is to evaluate the school committee, if not the school committee itself? While it is true that as individuals, members of the committee are "evaluated" when they stand for re-election or reappointment there is no prescribed agency, no prescribed vehicle for the school committee, as a body, to be evaluated -except by the body itself!

Why do a self-evaluation? While there are many potential benefits, there are two essential questions that could be answered. They are:

- 1. Is the committee doing the right things?**
- 2. Are the "right things" being done the "right way"?**

The Massachusetts Association of School Committees has developed this package to serve as a guide to members who wish to conduct a self-evaluation. The guide is more of a process than an instrument. Self-evaluation by the school committee can yield significant insights and improvement in the total operation of the committee. It can also demonstrate to the entire organization the committee's affirmation of, and commitment to, improvement and accountability in the continuing implementation of Education Reform.

The Process for Conducting a Self-Evaluation

The process for performing a self-evaluation is a three-step process:

- 1. Planning the evaluation**
- 2. Completing the evaluation**
- 3. Processing the data**

Planning the evaluation requires the committee to reach agreement on areas of evaluation. This can include, but is certainly not limited to, the following areas of concern:

- governance
- operations
- member relations
- committee/superintendent relations
- strategic planning
- community relations
- fiscal management
- conduct of school committee meetings

A list of specific items that you may want to consider in each category is listed in the appendix to this document.

At this point it is important to note that while the process for the evaluation of the superintendent calls for clear, measurable goals; the committee need not restrict itself to that specifically for this process. Much of what the committee needs to address are the more subjective and *qualitative* factors in areas such as group dynamics that are such an integral part of a school committee's effectiveness.

Once the committee has met (with or without the help of a facilitator) to decide on what categories will be incorporated into the evaluation, they can begin to choose the *descriptors* within each category (See appendix) . This important step may involve a considerable amount of discussion. Try not to "split hairs" and have too many variations of the same point. Later in the process, you should recognize that one of the key benefits of self-evaluation is the actual discussion among committee members as you review the results. Once you have settled on the categories and descriptors, you are ready to complete the self-evaluation.

SCHOOL COMMITTEE SELF-EVALUATION

When establishing a deadline for completing the evaluation, it is important to give each member enough time so they won't feel rushed. It is common for each evaluation to be anonymous. Designate someone to collect the forms and do a composite scoring.

Processing the data can often be more effective when the committee uses a facilitator. Many of the issues and examples that will be used by members in the discussion can involve personalities and interpersonal dynamics and an objective non-member can be an invaluable aid in keeping the dialogue on-track and focused.

Remember that a key benefit, apart from the "report card" that results from the processing of data, is the enlightening (and non-threatening) discussion of issues that would never have been "agenda items" on their own. To this end, try and choose a setting that is comfortable and informal. While the meeting must be an open meeting, it must be set up for the benefit of committee members to have an honest and productive dialogue. Limit the discussion to the participants.

There are two ways to look at the scoring. The most obvious way is to find the areas where there is strong agreement. If there is strong agreement that improvement is needed in a particular area, then this should become part of your new "action plan." If there is agreement that something is working, then keep up the good work!

The other way to view the scoring is to look for areas where there is no strong agreement. If half the committee believes the committee does a great job on the budget, and half the committee believes that there is room for improvement, then an area for discussion has been identified. It is in these discussions that members can learn about each other, find ways to reach common ground, and develop a plan to move forward together. The most important thing is not to let the report hang in the air - use it to develop your own "professional development plan" for the school committee. Ask your facilitator or one of your members to draft a synopsis of your discussion, and initiate plans to put into action the ideas generated in the process, or to develop a plan for the committee to receive training.

City charters and town by-laws may also provide direction for the committee. The more that is discussed up front, the smoother the process for making decisions can be.

Member Relations
